

VOLF LODGE DEDICATED TO DON BARTO

The idea to rebuild Senior Log Cabin was inspired by the desire to recognize and appreciate a remarkable member of the Tohkomeupog Tribe, Don Barton. Don has now dedicated 40 consecutive seasons to camp and continues to enrich all of our lives at Tohkomeupog. Don was Director of the Mighty Wolf Clan for 17 years, (1982 to 1988; 1991 to 2000) - tying him for the camp record. Don shares this record with another legendary Tohkomeupog figure, Jim G. James, (1947 to 1963), for whom the original Senior Log Cabin was dedicated. The Wolf Lodge, as it has now been dubbed, was a labor of love that brought many alumni back to the valley throughout spring and summer months. During the camp season, alumni were able to work with current Tohko staff and Wolf Clan campers. Don Barton was also an enthusiastic participant, not knowing that his efforts would culminate in a grand celebration at which he would be the guest of honor. Somehow we made it through the entire camp summer keeping these plans a secret from Don. I'm so happy we pulled it off. The dedication ceremony of the new Wolf Lodge was very successful. We had almost 200 people in attendance. Don was certainly surprised by the attention... and touched by the love and appreciation expressed at the ceremony. Construction of the Wolf Lodge has been funded largely through alumni support. If you are interested in contributing money toward completion of the project, we welcome your help. The names of people who choose to contribute will be engraved on wood salvaged from the original cabin and placed Don Barton, with his son, Mike on display inside the new Wolf Lodge. ··NO MATTER WHAT, KIDS COME FIRST·

So picture this. You are somewhere on Franconia Ridge. It is cold. There is some rain, 2 miles left to the camp site, and everyone is tired. Next thing you here is the question "How much further?!". You turn around and with a smile on your face say "We will get there when we get there and you should enjoy the hike!" A phrase that always popped into my mind at this time was "Kids come first no matter what." Little did I know how much this phrase would follow me into my adult life and career.


I consider myself lucky to have gone to Tohkomeupog as a camper, CIT, and counselor. My time there also inspired me to hike the Appalachian Trail. Following the trail, I went to work at a residential school for individuals with cognitive disabilities and behavioral issues. I would spend the next 6 years at the school as a severe special needs teacher while I earned my degree in the same field. What I did not expect was how much camp would prepare me to work in this position. I was faced with daily challenges that included dealing with behavioral issues, encouraging independence, and attempting to find creative teaching methods for my students. When faced with a difficult challenge I would regularly think the phrase "kids come first no matter what". I may have taken the phrase a bit too literally at times, but some of my proudest moments as a special education teacher would not have happened if not for my experience at Tohkomeupog.

One of those specific experiences had to do with an individual who required numerous individuals to work with him at all times and whose aggressive episodes were triggered by coughing and sneezing. Not many people were willing to work with this individual, and less were willing to work individually with him. We were tasked with bringing this individuals staffing down from a 3:1 ratio to a 1:1 ratio. It was a challenge, but in the end he was walking around the school with me running errands and dropping off documents. This would not have happened if not for my time at Tohko.

"Kids come first no matter what." This is a phrase that I find myself living every day. Because of it, I now find myself working for Cambridge Rindge and Latin in Cambridge Massachusetts helping to develop a transition program for individuals between the ages of 18-22. I intend to expand my knowledge in the field by getting another Masters degree in Applied Behavioral Analysis and getting my Board Certified Behavior Analyst Certificate. All of this is thanks to Tohkomeupog. Again... "Kids come first no matter what."
